# THE TREES

— ADRIENNE RICH

## Detailed Explanation:

The poem “The Trees” presents an unusual yet **highly symbolic situation** in which trees that had been confined within a house begin to move out toward the **forest**. At the literal level, the poet describes how, during the night, the trees gradually start leaving the house. Their roots struggle to detach themselves from the **cracked floor of the veranda**, their branches press forcefully against the glass windows, and their leaves drift outward into the open atmosphere. The poet notices the sounds of breaking branches and observes the forest slowly filling with trees that are returning to their **natural habitat**.

Thus, through rich imagery, symbolism, and personification, Adrienne Rich presents a poetic vision of **liberation** in which nature—and symbolically women—breaks away from artificial restrictions and returns to its natural and rightful space.

## Poetic Device Explanations

### Metaphor

### Personification

These images also metaphorically represent the effort required for social transformation.

### Symbolism

The poem relies heavily on symbolic elements. The trees represent women, the house signifies restrictive social frameworks, and the forest symbolizes freedom and the natural environment where growth and independence are possible. The breaking of glass and walls stands for the destruction of limitations that hinder women's progress.

### Repetition

Certain expressions and images associated with the movement of trees toward the forest recur throughout the poem. This repetition highlights the continuous and unstoppable nature of change and reinforces the idea of a gradual yet determined movement toward liberation.

### Contrast

A strong contrast exists between the enclosed interior of the house and the expansive, natural forest outside. This opposition emphasizes the difference between confinement and freedom, thereby strengthening the central theme of liberation.

## Central Message

The poem conveys the idea that freedom and self-expression are inherent rights that cannot be suppressed indefinitely. Through the image of trees leaving the house, the poet emphasizes the emancipation and upliftment of women from limiting domestic roles. The poem suggests that, like trees, women naturally belong in a broader world where they can grow, develop their identities, and participate actively in society.

Ultimately, the poem celebrates the rise of women's independence and the dismantling of patriarchal barriers.

## Poet's Tone

The tone of the poem is contemplative, optimistic, and subtly revolutionary. Whispering — speaking in a soft, low voice

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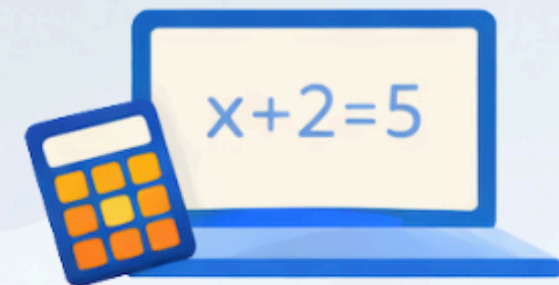
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
